We farewelled our founder and ship builder Mr Russell Harris, who retired from the board at 83 years young! Russell's vision for the Trust and the ship have been at the forefront of our strategy and it has been an absolute pleasure to work with him. His contribution to the welfare of our Northland youth and the Trust is his legacy and an inspiration to all.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees and all involved in the Trust past and present we wish Russell a great retirement and we thank him for all that he has done.

We also farewelled Bronwyn Bouer Hunt from the board, whose contribution over the years has been immense, and we wish her well and thank her for her service and the work that she continues to do for Northland.



Our Year in Review

Tō mātao tau ki muri

Tēna koutou katoa,

This year the R. Tucker Thompson Sail Training Trust regained stability, grabbed every opportunity, and planned carefully for the future. The Trust is in a solid position following two years of uncertainty, weather events and disruption. A strong team, good systems, sufficient reserves, and consistent Youth Development Voyage results put the organisation in a strong position to plan for both the short- and long-term future. The Trust represents a well-resourced, progressive and professional organisation, equipped to enhance the lives of Northland rangatahi, whanau and community.

The 7-Day Youth Development Voyage continues to deliver consistently outstanding results. A close relationship with Otago University researchers ensures outcomes for youth remain relevant, and this work continues to shape and enhance delivery. Twenty life-enhancing Youth Development Voyages were delivered during this financial year.

Partnering with experts and other high-performing organisations proved to be the winning formula for training, qualifying and placing young people into maritime employment. Fourteen students completed our inaugural QDC (Qualified Deck Crew) training, paving the way for the continued delivery of this programme in the years ahead.

Confidence in tourism was rebuilt and the commercial schedule and delivery were optimised to increase gross profit and efficiency. The success of the youth programme is underpinned by the delivery of a world-class tourism product.

The financial model has deliberately diverse revenue streams. Grant funding, sponsorships, donations and commercial revenue, all remain important sources of revenue. Increased operational expenses were met by taking advantage of commercial opportunities and seeking and securing new grant funding.

Partnering with high-performing organisations and businesses was a key focus. The Trust's network of supporters is increasing, and relationships are constantly strengthening in depth and breadth across education, conservation, iwi and other Youth Trusts and programmes.

A deliberate approach to deliver quality marketing and communications has strengthened the profile of the brand and the public understanding of the Trust's purpose and focus on youth.

Physical and reputational risk management continue to be at the fore. Proactive and safe maritime operations remain imperative and employee well-being and performance management underpin all operations.

The ship is in good shape following a successful maintenance period, and astute and proactive management from the internal team. A smart, experienced, passionate team of mariners including the Trustees, bosun, operations staff, crew and masters, all take very good care of our waka.

It was a year to recalibrate, rebalance and prepare for the future. The results of the financial year set the Trust up to plan and achieve lofty goals in the next decade. Our Trustees and team are focused on achieving a long-term impact for the youth of Northland. The love of our ship, our connection to our place, and whanaungatanga drive our ship. Being part of this special kaupapa remains a privilege and the future is looking bright.







My favourite thing was sailing the ship by ourselves and snorkelling at Deep Water Cove with all the fish. I will remember the memories I created on the voyage and the awesome places we went; I will also remember the friends I made on this trip.

Maritime training and employment

Creating positive futures for Northland's young people

Here at the R. Tucker Thompson Sail Training Trust connection is our cornerstone. With our young people at the heart of the project, we connected an incredible group of people to create a new maritime training programme.

The R. Tucker Thompson Sail Training Trust teamed up with Queenstown Resort College Tai Tokerau (QRC) and Skipper Training NZ to deliver a Maritime and Tourism Operations training programme based in Paihia. The collaborative initiative was developed to create a formal training pathway to education and employment for qualified deckhand positions on commercial vessels operating in the Bay of Islands.

The programme delivered the QRC Tourism
Operations programme and training towards
Maritime NZ's Qualified Deckhand Crew certification.
This combination made up the Maritime Tourism
Operations course. Students focused on achieving
two certificate qualifications shaped to suit the
current local job market. We had 14 students
complete the course and pass their Maritime NZ
Qualified Deck Crew certification. Six students went
on to work in maritime tourism, tourism and other
local industries.

Tourism Operations provided an introduction to the dynamic tourism industry. The programme focused on the concepts of Manaakitanga (the process of showing respect, generosity and care for others) and Whanaungatanga (a relationship through shared experiences and working together that provides people with a sense of belonging), and how these are applied in a professional tourism and hospitality context. Graduates learnt the importance of customer service and interpretation in delivering a unique visitor experience.

The Maritime Operations part of the course was delivered by Skipper Training NZ. They delivered industry training to prepare candidates to sit the Maritime NZ Qualified Deck Crew certification. Students spent time on boats in the Bay completing their Qualified Deck Crew Training Record Book to prepare for the Maritime NZ oral exam.

The R. Tucker Thompson Sail Training Trust sourced funding through the Mayors Task Force for Jobs and support from the MSD Community Recovery Programme to deliver the QDC programme. Our kaupapa is Learning for Life Through the Sea: this initiative stands to extend the benefits of our core youth development programme to offer long-term opportunities for our rangatahi, whanau and communities. To our students, thank you for your hard work, feedback, motivation and commitment. We are proud of each one of you.



Shaping a strategy

Empowering all Northland youth to lead rewarding lives

The R. Tucker Thompson Sail Training Trust has evolved since its establishment in 2006. The organisation consistently delivers profound results for Northland rangatahi (youth) on the 7-day youth development programme. Building on a strong foundation, the emerging strategic focus is to provide long-term positive outcomes for our youth, beyond the 7-day voyage.

The previous strategy (2019 to 2022) produced consistent results and a strong foundation has informed this most recent shift in direction. Our strategy development is underpinned by anecdotal evidence (listening carefully to the stories, identifying themes), as well as quantifiable evidence from our Otago University research and ongoing surveys.

Development and review of strategy have evolved over the last two years, in line with operational and environmental changes, both internal and external. The employment of a new Chief Executive, recovery from Covid, emerging challenges and opportunities for youth, and increased weather events have informed the new strategy. To drive our strategy forward we have regenerated our Board of Trustees to gain diverse thinking, strengthened governance experience and include identified skills in the skills matrix. The new strategy outlined above signals a deliberate and strategic shift from 50% tourism and 50% youth to deliver more youth voyages and spend 75% of our time on this kaupapa (project).

Focus on connection and belonging with rangatahi results in the forming of close bonds, and a deep sense of whānau, which provides a unique opportunity to influence and steer our youth beyond the 7-day voyage. The increase in confidence, selfesteem, resilience and positive attitudes towards the future is consistently expressed by our rangatahi as "I can do more than I thought I could do". The next strategic phase for the Trust will capitalise on this sense of capability, and the deep connections we have made, to empower our youth to lead rewarding lives.

Our waka, our people and our place have the power to change lives, whānau and communities in the North. This strategic step will optimise the use of our waka, propel our people, regenerate our environment and enhance mana in every action we take.

The strategic priorities are built on the foundation of effective financial management, innovative leadership, and a high level of legal, health and safety, and employment compliance. Risk and reputation management continue to be at the fore, and people and performance management underpin all operations. Smart and safe maritime operations continue to be imperative. Consistent high-quality delivery of our 7-day voyages will continue as our core service.

Our Purpose (Why)

By empowering all Northland youth to lead rewarding lives we will drive positive outcomes for all rangatahi, whānau and communities in Te Tai Tokerau.

Strategic Priorities (What)

This strategic phase will optimise the use of our waka and maritime knowledge, propel our youth and people, regenerate our environment and enhance mana for the benefit of Northland rangatahi. To empower all Northland youth to lead rewarding lives we will focus on four Strategic Priorities:

- Kaitiaki aspirational by nature
- Wānanga drive maritime education
- · Waka preserve our ship and tall ship traditions

Russell Harris

An extraordinary man

In 2022, after 42 years being at the helm of the R. Tucker Thompson - the ship and her Trust - Russell Harris resigned from his role as Trustee. This marked the end of an era in terms of Russell's formal role; however, he remains an important member of day-to-day operations and a long-term inspiration for our kaupapa (project) and people.

Russell's involvement with the ship began with a friendship. Russ met Tod Thompson working on building another tall ship, the Bounty. Their paths crossed again in the early 1980s when Tod Thompson and Greta Simmonds approached Russell with the prospect of finishing the construction of The Good Ship. Russ readily agreed and the hull was trucked to Russell's house at Mangawhai Heads where for the next four years the trio and the Mangawhai community set to work completing our ship.

Russell became responsible chiefly for the engineering work, Tod for the rig and Greta did much of the business management, raising bank loans, negotiating with New Zealand television and holding the team together. Little by little, enough materials and money came in to finish the ship and launch her in front of the house at Mangawhai Heads. The launching from the beach on 12 October 1985 was an emotional and iconic local event.

The first job for the Tucker, as she is affectionately known, was to star in the New Zealand-made television series "Adventurer". After a season on the Northland coast, she set off across the world to join the fleet of tall ships gathering near Tower Bridge in London ready to take part in the re-enactment of the first voyage of a fleet of convict ships to Sydney, as part of Australia's bicentenary celebrations.

The Tucker sailed again with some of these ships in the Pacific Islands in the winter and spring of 1989, carrying her full-time professional crew of six and up to ten charterers at a time for cruising among the islands in the ocean passages from and to New Zealand. The Tucker delivered tourism sailings in the Bay of Islands and began work in youth development. In 2006 Russell sold the ship into the not for profit trust for the purpose of helping Northland youth to thrive.

Russell, from the inception of this dream, has brought enormous spirit, energy and optimism. He continues to bring his passion, energy and resounding love for life to our whanau. He tells us stories, reminds us of our core values, and brings his incredible affection for our waka to our team. He never lets us forget that our ship will bring the magic, that she will take care of us, if we take care of her.

If you are lucky enough to have spent time with Russell, or better still sailed with him, you will know him for his charisma, showmanship and all-round magnetism. Russ cares deeply for people, in particular the people of the North. His rural character and innovative mind mean he has many interesting projects to his name: he has built and flown his own plane, acted and directed many plays, but ultimately, Russell is a farmer at heart with a love for both the land and the ocean in equal measure.

In late November 2022 Russell resigned from his role as Trustee but he is still very connected with us. Russ often comes and farewells youth voyages, inspiriting our youth, whanau and crew as they set off on their adventures. He visits us often in our office to support our team, provide encouragement and, of course, tell this story often. We are grateful for his enormous and continuing contribution to our kaupapa (project). We love Russell: he is our forever whanau.

Our Commercial work

Wild and wonderful projects!

We have a unique funding model; like sailing a tall ship, it takes teamwork. Over summer, we operate daily sailing trips, and the profits from our tourism activities are used to fund our youth development voyages. We also invite schools, businesses and community groups to come and sail with us, and we charter the ship for weddings, birthdays and many wild and wonderful projects. Here are some of the fun projects we tackled in the summer of 2022 and 2023.

Film work: The Convert - A Lee Tamahori Film

We were thrilled to charter the ship to Lee Tamahori and his incredible film production team and some Hollywood stars. It was all hands on deck as we hosted a 30-strong film, make-up, costume, and sound crew. We sailed to Tutukaka, the stunning backdrop to the story set in early 19th-century New Zealand. The film, The Convert, had its world premiere, featured as an Official Selection, in the 2023 Toronto International Film Festival.

History Day - Hohi

Ngāti Torehina hosted a special day at Hohi,
Marsden's Cross. Rangatahi, special guests and crew
from the R Tucker Thompson joined the festivities.
The day was for different groups to come together
for a historical and ecological adventure to learn
about the vibrant history, geology and unique
marine environment of this significant area of
Pēwhairangi, Bay of Islands. Speakers included Ngāti
Torehina kaumatua, an archaeologist, historians
from Heritage NZ, a geologist and marine ecologists.
This was an informative and interesting day that will
be repeated in 2024.

North Chamber - Business After 5

The Trust hosted the Northland Business
Community on board the ship for a North Chamber
Business After 5 event. We hosted a ship full of
business owners who were able to network, socialise
and hear about our kaupapa while sailing the Bay.







Whangarei – a special visit to the town centre
